

This Indenture Made this twenty eighth day of October A.D. 1859.  
 between J. C. P. Wood of the County of Douglas Territory of Kansas  
 of the first part and Moses Scott of the County and Territory aforesaid  
 of the second part, Witnesseth, that the said party of the first part  
 for and in consideration of the sum of three hundred dollars to him in hand  
 paid by the said party of the second part, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged,  
 has granted, bargained and sold and by these presents doth grant, Bargain  
 and sell unto the said party of the second part his heirs and assigns, all those certain  
 pieces or parcels of land situated the City of Lawrence said County and  
 Territory, to wit Lots Massachusetts Street No fifty seven (57)  
 Kentucky Street No one hundred fifty one (151) Connecticut Street  
 one hundred forty eight (148) and one hundred eighty six (186) - and  
 New Jersey Street No one hundred forty two (163) To have and to hold the  
 said premises with the appurtenances, unto the said party of the second part  
 his heirs and assigns forever. And the said party of the first part does hereby  
 covenant with the said party of the second part, his heirs and assigns, that he  
 is lawfully seized of the premises aforesaid, that said premises are free and  
 clear from all encumbrances whatsoever, and that he will forever warrant  
 and defend the same with the appurtenances, unto the said  
 party of the second part, his heirs and assigns, against the lawful  
 claim of all persons whomsoever.
