

Lawrence Kansas July 11 1868

The Board of Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment.

There were present Commissioners Butler, Griffith and Platts and Paul R. Brooks.

The following proceedings were had.

The report of Road Drivers appointed at the April session on the petition of A. J. Grew and others having been filed in the clerk's office was taken up and read and no legal objections being made thereto and the report being favorable to the location and establishment of the road, it was on motion ordered that the report plat and field notes be recorded, and that the Order of the Board be issued to the proper Overseer of roads to cause said road as located to be opened for public travel.

The report of the Reviewers appointed at the April session of the Board on the petition of J. L. Jones and others having been filed in the clerk's office it was taken up and read the report being favorable to the establishment of the road and no legal objections being made thereto it was ordered by the board that the report plat and survey be recorded and that the clerk be directed to issue the Order of the Board to the proper Overseer of roads that said road as located be opened for public travel.

The report of the Reviewers appointed on the petition of R. C. Jackson and others was read and on motion was laid over until the October session of the board.

The report of the Reviewers appointed at the April session of the Board on the petition of Wm. Hughes and others for the vacation of a road having been filed in the clerk's office, it was presented and read and being favorable to the vacation of the road and no legal objection being made thereto it was ordered that the road be vacated and the report plat and survey be recorded.

The report of the Reviewers appointed February 11 1868 on the petition of B. Hitchcock and others was read and laid over until the October meeting of the board.

The following resolution was offered and adopted.

Whereas the Board of Commissioners of Douglas County now in session are concerned with the citizens of our County feel a deep interest in the important objects involved in the treaty with the Osage Indians now before the Senate of the United States for ratification and among these objects we recognize of great and permanent importance 1st the extinguishment of Indian titles to territory within the limits of the State 2^d the construction of a great National thoroughfare North and South affording communications between the valley of the Missouri and the Gulf of Mexico Therefore resolved that we earnestly urge our Senators in Congress to use all honorable means to secure the ratification of said treaty with such amendments as shall provide
