It is Ordered that the several reports of the ruinous with the survey and plat be recorded and that said road be established a public highway. It is further Ordered that the County Clerk issue, in the name of the board an order to the proper Overseers of roads directing them to cause said road to be opened according to law.

The ruinous having filed a report in words and figures as follows to wit: To the board of Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas: In obedience to your order, issued at your July session at 1872 the undersigned ruinous appointed under said order met with F. C. Darling Surveyor at the house of J. H. Harrison on the 29 day of August inst. and were severally sworn to discharge faithfully and impartially the duties required of us in said Order E. Marshall and J. H. Harrison were selected by us as chain carriers and F. C. Darling as a marker who were also duly sworn. We then proceeded to run said proposed road on the line described in your order, and caused the same to be surveyed, "as prayed for in the petition or as near the same as, in our opinion a good road can be made at a reasonable expense taking into consideration the utility, convenience, and inconvenience, and expense, which will result to individuals as well as the public by the location of said road as shown by the field notes and plat of the Surveyor hereto attached. We would respectfully report that the said road where it varies from the section line on the land of C. H. Langston ought to be vacated for the following reasons: that we deem it practicable for the road to run on the section line, which we think can be done in this case at a reasonable expense. We have also determined that the public convenience requires that the road running through the land of J. H. Harrison and L. R. Bryant be not vacated all of
