

cluded in said district the boundaries thereof. The improvements herein prayed for are to be paid from two annual assessments to be levied upon the lands above described constituting said Benefit Road district.

We further request your honorable body to find and declare said road improvements to be a public utility by order of your board and to make and order said improvements be made and paid for and that all necessary action therefore be taken as prescribed in Senate Bill No. 576, House bill No. 601, and Senate bill No. 506, enacted into laws by the Legislature of Kansas of 1917.

(Here follows a list of 128 names, with a description of the lands and the number of acres owned or controlled by each of the signers to the petition).

The resignation of Mr. C. D. Overaker as clerk of the P.C.B. - Compton Township, under date of October 10, 1917, was read and accepted. The matter of appointing a successor to fill such vacancy was left open for the time being.

Friday, November 9, 1917.

The board met in adjourned regular session, with all members present & Commissioners and Chairman J. L. Horner presiding.

Early in the session the board took an adjournment and drove to the County Home, primarily to measure the walnut logs which were being cut off the grounds, and incidentally on an official inspection trip. The session being resumed at 1:30 p.m.
