In this event, that you do not agree with the above idea
of handling the affairs of this office then the only remaining posi-
-position is for me to resign, but I cannot do that unless you
will guarantee to check me out with a full statement to the
public that our accounts are O.K. and that your new treasurer
for appointment will accept the office with that understanding,
and that I will be absolutely relieved of all responsibility under
my hand. If you can guarantee that the above condition will
be met by you as the representative of this County, then I hereby hand
you my resignation as Treasurer of Douglas County, to take effect
at the close of business January 31-1920.

With the conclusion of the reading of the letter the board went
Horsford into executive session to discuss the matter at length.

Resignation Upon motion of Commissioner Cox, which motion was
Accepted - seconded by Commissioner Hoover, the resignation of J. M.

Horsford as County Treasurer was accepted, to take effect at
the close of business January 31-1920. A vote being asked on
the adoption of this motion Commissioner Cox, Hoover and
Chairman Andrews voted affirmatively, as not one vote being
cast negative Chairman Andrews declared the motion carried.

Name E. Commissioner Hoover moved that F. D. Brooks be appointed
D. Brooks as treasurer of Douglas County as successor to J. M. Horsford, to
County hold until the office is filled by election to be held in November,
Treasurer 1920. Commissioner Cox seconded the motion. A ballot
being taken, F. D. Brooks received 3 votes, and there being no
votes cast for any other person Chairman Andrews declared F. D.
Brooks the unanimous choice of the board Treasurer of Douglas Co. to succeed
J. M. Horsford, on February 1-1920.
