

Wednesday - June 15, 1921.

The board met in adjourned regular session, all commissioners present, and Commissioner and Chairman A. L. Cox presiding.

The board took up the matter of the appointment of Poor Commission. Three applications were received, namely: D. B. Hammett, Rachel Flory, Emma J. Kennedy. The chairman ordered a vote by ballot, which being taken, resulted in Rachel Flory receiving one vote, Mrs. Emma J. Kennedy two votes, and not any vote being cast for D. B. Hammett. Chairman Cox declared that Emma J. Kennedy having received a majority of all the votes cast, was elected Poor Commission for a period of one year from expiration of term of present incumbent, which is July 31, 1921.

The board took up the matter of the improvement of N. 7th St., in North Lawrence, from the intersection of N. 7th St. and Locust St. to the north City Line to connect with section A Ft. to Ft. highway, and by motion made, seconded, and passed without division, adopted the following resolution to wit:

Whereas, The board of Commissioners of the City of Lawrence, Douglas County, Kansas, has adopted a resolution which is attached hereto providing for the improvement of North Seventh Street in that part of said City commonly known as North Lawrence, from the intersection of said North Seventh Street and Locust Street north to the north City limits, by paving said North Seventh Street at a width of eighteen feet, with such width at curves as good engineering practice may require, the said paving to be constructed of concrete according to plans and specifications to be prepared by the City Engineer, and
