The quarterly report of the Sheriff for the quarter ending June 30, 1922, was received, audited & approved.

The following resolution by motion duly made & seconded was passed by the Board, to wit=

Resolved, That the personal property assessment placed against C. E. Vickery, ~~as~~ agent, in amount \$6,415, be and the same is hereby ordered stricken from the 1922 Douglas county tax roll for the following reasons, to wit: As agent for Xenophone Clarence Vickery, of Chicago, Ills., class v. Vickery of Lawrence, Kansas, listed for taxation certain mortgages amounting to \$6,415. It has since been ascertained that these intangible evidence of possible assessment are not held by the agent, C. E. Vickery, in Lawrence, Kansas, but are in possession of Xenophone Clarence Vickery in Chicago, Ills., and therefore beyond the jurisdiction of Kansas assessing officers and not assessable in Douglas county, Kansas, although C. E. Vickery collects the interest due on these mortgages and forwards it to Chicago to Xenophone Clarence Vickery, for which service as agent he is paid a certain amount in money.

Further Resolved, That this action of the Board of County commissioners of Douglas county be submitted to the State Tax commission for their approval or rejection.
