

Saturday, January 6, 1923

The board met in adjourned regular session, Commissioners Stule, Kettinger & Harpold as the County Clerk present. Commissioner & Chairman Stule presided.

Upon motion duly made, seconded & passed, the clerk was instructed to notify the County Treasurer & transfer the money collected in the ~~now~~ standing to the account of the County "Emergency Bridge Fund" to the County fund bridge fund.

By similar action (upon motion duly made, seconded and passed) the board authorized the transfer of \$15,000 of the State Aid Road Fund to the Fort & Fort sinking fund.

County warrants, which have been issued and held by the County clerk for a period slightly longer than three years, awaiting claimants, amounting in the aggregate to \$1317.50, were, upon motion duly made, seconded and passed, ordered cancelled, according to law, and filed away.

The monthly report of the Commissioners of the Poor was received, audited, and upon motion duly made, seconded and passed, approved.

The quarterly reports of the Probate Judge, the Clerk of the District Court and the County Treasurer were received, audited and approved.

By motion duly made, seconded and passed, the board ordered a cancellation of tax, in amount \$6.97, appearing against Mrs. Emma Johnson on the 1922 tax roll, for the reason that there was a double taxation on the same property, one of which taxes she has paid in full.

By motion duly made, seconded and passed, the board ordered a ~~tax~~ cancellation of tax, in amount \$4.65, appearing on the 1922 tax roll, against Ralph J. Brigham, by reason of his being a non-resident he claiming to have paid the tax in Kansas City, Mo.

The resignation of Harry L. Kane, elected Constable in the City of Lawrence at the general election held November 7, 1922, was received, and he having filed his bond & duly qualified, it was upon motion duly made, seconded and passed, accepted.

There being no further business before the board, upon motion duly made, seconded and passed, adjournment was taken until 10:00 o'clock Monday morning, January 8, 1923.
