

COMMISSIONER'S RECORD M

February 23, 1933.

Pursuant to adjournment taken on February 16, 1933, the Board of County Commissioners in adjourned regular session with Earl T. Black, Chairman, X. J. Kennedy and James F. Brass, Commissioners, and the County Clerk present.

The question of a new wage scale for county employees and deputies came before the Board for consideration, and after a full discussion of the matter the Board unanimously adopted the following scale, beginning March 1, 1933.

1 County Road and Bridge worker:

General Foreman	52 9/10 cents per hour

Tractor & Grader men	35

Motor Patrolmen	35
Team Patrolmen	42 1/2
Bridge Foreman	50

Common bridge labor	30
Bookkeeper in Eng. office	40
Chainmen	32 1/2
Rodmen	25

2 All officers and deputies whose compensation is fixed by law shall receive the salary so fixed.

3. Assistant to the Probate Judge \$30. per month
 One clerk for County Treasurer 40 cents per hour
 One clerk for County Clerk 37 1/2
 One Assistant for Clerk of Court \$50. per month
 Extra help in office, unless by approval of the Board, 30 cents per hour.

4. Custodian of Court House \$75. per month

On motion of X. J. Kennedy, seconded by James F. Brass, the February session of the Board of County Commissioners was adjourned.

The minutes of the proceedings of the Board during the February session were read and approved this 6 day of March, 1933.

March 6, 1933

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session for the month of March with Earl T. Black, Chairman, X. J. Kennedy and James F. Brass, Commissioners, and the County Clerk present. The minutes of the proceedings of the Board during the February session were read and approved. Claims against the county were read and allowed as per allowance register.

On motion by X. J. Kennedy, seconded by James F. Brass, the Board purchased from the Industrial Machinery Company one used Rock Crusher for the sum of \$850 to be paid if the machinery is found to be satisfactory.

No further business appearing, the Board, on motion made and seconded, did adjourn to March 8, 1933.

March 8, 1933

Pursuant to adjournment taken on March 4, 1933, the Board of County Commissioners met this 8 day of March, 1933, with Earl T. Black, Chairman, X. J. Kennedy and James F. Brass, Commissioners, and the county clerk present. Claims against the county were presented and allowed as per Allowance Register.

On motion properly made and seconded, the Board appropriated the sum of \$150.00 from the County Farm and Poor Fund to pay for rent of land to be used in relief gardening, said appropriation to be available in installments of \$25.00 per month for six months.

On motion by Kennedy, seconded by Brass, the Board adjourned till March 11, 1933

March 11, 1933

The Board of County Commissioners met this 11 day of March, 1933, pursuant to adjournment of March 8, 1933, with Earl T. Black, Chairman, X. J. Kennedy and James F. Brass, Commissioners, and the County Clerk present. Additional claims against the county were allowed as per Allowance Register.

On motion by Black, seconded by Brass, the Board unanimously passed a resolution adopting the provisions of Chapter 318 of the session laws of 1931. The resolution adopted reads as follows:

Whereas, the Kansas River flows through Douglas County and the mileage of the river banks of said river in said county is 31.375 miles, and,

Whereas, under Section two (2) of said Chapter 318 of the session Laws of 1931, it is required therein that the Board of County Commissioners of any county through which said river flows, shall adopt the provisions of said Law before it may obtain the benefits provided for therein, and particularly of Section Four (4) thereof,

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County in regular adjourned session this 11 day of March, 1933, that it adopts and accepts the provisions of Chapter 318 of the Session Laws of 1931, and that in pursuance thereof it is ordered that a survey be made showing definitely the
