

# COMMISSIONER'S RECORD M

of Lawrence, including lots and improvements, be removed from the tax rolls-- should be made tax exempt. Now, again, the said Forrest A. Jackson appeared before the Board and asked that the following be made a matter of record in the minutes of the Board of County Commissioners.

In The Matter of the Application of  
THE LAWRENCE BUSINESS COLLEGE, a Corporation, to be declared tax exempt.

NOW, On this 6th day of June, 1935, the above matter comes regularly before the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, for decision, the same having been duly heard on the 28th day of May, 1935, by the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, sitting as a County Board of Equalization and taken under advisement. The said Lawrence Business College appearing by its Secretary-Treasurer, E. S. Weatherby, and its attorneys, Forrest A. Jackson, and John M. Kinkel, and the said Board of County Commissioners as a Board of Equalization being present in person and by its attorney, R. B. Stevens, County Attorney, and said Board of County Commissioners sitting as a County Board of Equalization finds that the real estate and personal property belonging to the said Lawrence Business College is not exempt from taxation and that Lot No. 89 on Louisiana Street and that Lots Nos. 1 and 2 in Block One (1) Lane's First Addition to the City of Lawrence in the City of Lawrence, Douglas County, State of Kansas, should remain on the tax rolls.

AND after a complete hearing said application was disposed of by the following motion: Moved by Earl T. Black and seconded by Chris Schaake, that the application of the Lawrence Business College, a corporation, to be declared tax exempt be denied. The motion was presented by Chairman James F. Brass, voted upon by said Commissioners, and all the said Commissioners voted aye.

A Miss Maud Rhinley of Baldwin, Kansas, made application for admittance to the State Sanatorium for tuberculosis, at Norton, Kansas. The application was properly filed and recommended by the examining physician, H. Penfield Jones, Health Officer for Douglas County. The application being duly considered and on motion properly seconded was voted unanimously that Miss Rhinley be allowed to enter the Sanatorium under the usual conditions touching the liability of the County.

The County Board felt a little concerned about the status of the Eudora Bridge considering the extremely high water, and at 3:30 left its chambers and with the engineer made a trip to the Eudora Bridge for the purpose of securing first hand information as to the condition of the flood waters, and the bridge.

On motion, properly seconded, the Board adjourned to meet again at 9:30 a. m., on Saturday June 8.
