For the printing and for the printing of delinquent taxes, 25¢ for description of property, 10¢ per lot.

These bids wered iscussed and the question was raised as to the legality of accepting bids for the printing of delinquent taxes for less then the amount the County charges the tax payer on the tax rolls. The County Attorney gave it as his opinion that the County may not charge the tax payer more then the actual cost of printing and publishing the amountsddelinquent. Whereupon, all bids were rejected and the County Clerk was asked to again request the papers to make bids and to distinguish between the regular official printing and the printing of delinquent taxes.

The County Commissioners with the County Engineer and the Poor Commissioner-Case Supervisor visited the County Farm and after a satisfying lunch repaired to the County Commissioner's room for further discussion pertaining to the County work, and then adjourned to meet at 9:30 A. M. in a special session on the 18th of February, 1936.
