

The minutes for the regular meetings of May, namely, May 4, 6, 9 and 13 and the minutes for the special meetings of May, namely, May 21, and the minutes of the session of the Board of County Commissioners, sitting as a Board of Equalization from May 16 to May 28 inclusive, were read. Corrections were suggested in the matter of the county accepting funds from the estate of James Moncrief in the paying of funds to the City for construction of a drainage ditch. Corrections were made on these items and the minutes for the Commissioners meetings with these corrections, and the minutes of the Board of Equalization were approved.

The County Clerk presented to the Board, bids as follows:

A. 6 Books Personal Property Tax Warrants. Each book to contain 100 to book, 500 each original and duplicate, 4 to page.

B 4 Volumes Tax Rolls, 1937, one book City of Lawrence, one book Lands No. 1, one book Lands No. 2 and one book Outside Lots.

The County Clerk had invited the Hall Lithographing Company of Topeka, to submit bids also, but no bids were submitted.

Whereupon, it was moved by Earl T. Black and seconded by Chris Schaaque that the award be made to the low bidder, namely, to the Journal World of Lawrence, Kansas, on their bids as submitted above.

County Attorney, R. B. Stevens, appeared before the Board with a resolution relative to the feeding of prisoners in the Douglas County Jail. The resolution, which follows, was prepared for the Board of County Commissioners by the County Attorney upon the advice of the Attorney General, which advice the Attorney General had given as his opinion that the Sheriff of Douglas County may not collect more than 50¢ per day for the feeding of prisoners confined within the Jail. The resolution follows:

## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, under Section 28-2423 R. S. K. Supp. 1933, the Sheriff of Douglas County was paid the sum of 60¢ per day for the board and keep of prisoners, and

WHEREAS, under Section 28-106 R. S. K. 1923 by interpretation of the County Attorney of this county the Sheriff was allowed and paid 60¢ per day for the board and keep of prisoners, and

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of the Attorney General of the State of Kansas rendered on the 9th day of June, 1936, that the Sheriff of Douglas County should receive 50¢ per day,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of Douglas County, that the Sheriff of Douglas County be now and hereafter paid the sum of 50¢ per day for the board and keep of prisoners as provided in Section 28-110 R. S. K.

Whereupon, it was moved by Earl T. Black and seconded by Chris Schaaque that the above resolution be adopted and by a unanimous vote of all Commissioners, all of the Commissioners voting "aye", it was so ordered.

No further business appearing, the Board adjourned to meet at the call of the County Clerk.

The Board of County Commissioners met as a Board of Equalization for the final three days' session for 1936. The purpose of the meeting was to hear any complaints that might have been made from the action of the Board when it sat in its regular period in May for hearing complaints as to any change or additions in assessments. Fritz Meyn appeared before the Board with the statement that he was not wholly satisfied with the value as placed upon his property designated as Lot 43, New Hampshire Street. He signified his intention of appealing to the State Tax Commission. Herman Broeker appeared again and reminded the Board of its consideration when it sat as a Board of County Commissioners under date of May 23, 1936, at which time an order from the Board of County Commissioners was given to the Treasurer, A. M. Gardner, for the cancellation of certain taxes on the N<sup>o</sup> Lot 62 Massachusetts Street. At the same time this order was written, a warrant was drawn for the refund of taxes for 1934, based on a valuation of
