

The County Board of Commissioners from Franklin County, Kansas, called on the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the use of the telephone in the Rehabilitation office, which office is located in the court house of Douglas County, Lawrence, Kansas. The question considered was whether or no Franklin and Jefferson Counties should pay the entire telephone bill in the Rehabilitation office, inasmuch, as the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County was furnishing office space, heat, lights, water, janitor service, etc. After some discussion, the question was disposed of in the following motion:

Moved that the counties of Jefferson and Douglas bear, equally, the expense of the telephone in the Rehabilitation office: this to include long distance calls; with the understanding, however, that the total bill to be borne by the two counties jointly, is not to exceed \$10.00 per month and with the further proviso that long distance calls be kept to the lowest possible minimum without impairing the efficiency of the office. It was argued that the camp of the Rehabilitation project was located in Franklin County while the work of the organization was given to both Franklin and Douglas Counties with the probability that the major portion of the work is done in Douglas County. Hence, Franklin County was relieved of any responsibility relative to the telephone.
