by payment. The same receipt number shall be entered on the tax judgment docket, the Clerk of Court to report collections of tax judgments to the County Treasurer quarterly, showing Warrant Number, Amount of Judgment, and Amount of Interest, and Clerk of Court Fees and Total Collected.

The Sheriff shall press collections of these tax judgments by letter and personal service as on the warrants previously in his hands without obtaining an execution with its additional costs, but if the taxpayer shall be unwilling to pay in this manner, the Sheriff shall obtain an execution to be issued by the Clerk of the District Court. All collections on judgments shall be reported by the Sheriff to the Clerk of the District Court and a monthly report to be made to the Board of County Commissioners of collections made by him.

It is understood that after August 15th, the Sheriff shall give his full time to the service and collection of the current year's tax warrants, working in the back year's collections when convenient.
