

COMMISSIONER'S RECORD M

Mr. Fred A. Vogler Sheriff of Douglas County with Henry Collins Deputy Sheriff, appeared before the Board asking that the present wage of Henry Collins namely \$90.00 per month be increased to \$115.00 per month. The matter was thoroughly discussed and finally disposed of in the following motion:

It was thereupon moved by Commissioner Brass and seconded by Commissioner Black that beginning March 1, 1937, the salary of Henry Collins, Deputy Sheriff be fixed at \$115.00 a month, on the condition that the Sheriff of Douglas County, Kansas shall not hire any extra deputies for irregular help except in cases of extreme emergency and that the duties of said office be expedited by the regular force now employed. *

No further business appearing, the Board adjourned to meet at 9:30 A. M. March 10, 1937.

The Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County met in regular adjourned session at 9:30 A. M. The Chairman, Chris Schaeke and Commissioners Earl T. Black and James F. Brass and the County Clerk U. S. G. Plank were present.

The minutes of the regular meetings and special meetings for the month of February were read and after minor corrections were made, were approved as corrected and read.

The remaining bills for county expenses and bills from the Department of Relief were presented and ordered paid as per Allowance Record.

Mrs. Mildred D. Watson, Poor Commissioner-Case Supervisor discussed with the Board the problems of a family known as the Mitchell family who live in North Lawrence. In the family are three children, some of whom have become a serious family problem. In order to aid the family, it was suggested that three of the older girls should be sent to the Vocational School at Topeka, Kansas. The final disposition is in the following motion:

Moved by James F. Brass and seconded by Earl T. Black that three girls of the Mitchell family be sent to the Vocational School in Topeka, Kansas, and that a tuition fee of \$11.00 each should be paid by the county. The motion was put by the Chairman Chris Schaeke and by unanimous vote of the Commissioners was ordered.

Engineer E. E. Trueblood, appeared before the Board with bids for lubricating oil for the county for the year 1937. The bidders and their prices per gallon in quantity lots are as follows:

The Socony-Vacuum Oil Company being the lowest bidders, the Board of County Commissioners agreed to a trial of their oil.

Henry L. Butler, representing petitioners for certain sections of a road in the West Hills district, to be made township roads, with Ed Johnson and Frank Topping of the Wakarusa Township Board appeared before the Commissioners.

The advisability of said sectors of road becoming township roads was discussed thoroughly. Fred Peterson a member of the Wakarusa Township Board being unable to be present at the meeting, final action of said petition was deferred until such time as all the members of the township Board could be present.

The Board adjourned.
