Abozan & Netron The Board of County Commissioners convened at 9:30 A. M., for the purpose of resolving itself into a Board of Equalization to adjust any discrepancies that may have arisen during the 1937 assessment period. All the Commissioners, namely: Chris Schaake, Chairman, Earl T. Black and James F. Brass, Commissioners, and T. R. Gerhart County Clerk were present.

Mr. C. F. Hardtarfor and Mr. A. T. Hatfield, appeared before the Board in reforence to the valuation on their property described as:

Less N53' of M_2^1 of Lot 17, Less N 53' of M_2^1 of Lot 19, and less N 53 ' of M_2^1 of E 133' of Lot 21, in Park Street.

The request was for the reduction of the valuation placed on the building at the last assessment period on real estate. Messrs. Mardtarfer and Hatfield claim that the building originally constructed and maintained as a theatre has an assessed valuation in excess of its true value.

The Board discussed thoroughly with the above mentioned people, and finally advised them that the matter would be taken under consideration.

George Ecke appeared before the Board in regard to the removal from the Assessment Roll of a house described as Lot 116, Tennessee Street, which has burned down. Mr. Ecke was informed that the house has already been removed from the Assessment Roll.
