

Kansas, and when so executed and registered and rejected by the State School Fund Commission, to deliver the same to Estes and Company of Topeka, Kansas, the purchaser thereof, upon payment of the purchase price.

Section 6. The proceeds of said bonds shall be placed in a separate fund to be used for the purpose of acquiring lands known as the Lone Star Lake, located in said county, and to furnish material for dams, spillways, roads and additional lands and such other improvements deemed necessary for a public park and recreational grounds for Douglas County, Kansas, at said location.

Section 7. The full faith, credit and resources of the County of Douglas, in the State of Kansas, shall be, and the same are, hereby irrevocably pledged for the prompt payment of said Park Bonds and the interest thereon, dated August 15, 1937, hereinbefore described. For the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and the principal thereof as the same shall become due, the Board of County Commissioners of said County shall annually levy upon all of the taxable property of said County a tax sufficient to produce a fund to pay the interest on said bonds and to pay the principal thereof as the same matures.

Section 8. Any and all previous action heretofore taken by the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, inconsistent with this resolution shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

September 27, 1937.

In a special session this 27th day of September, the Commissioners of Douglas County met to carry on county business that could not be attended to during the regular sessions. All members of the Board and the County Clerk were present.

The minutes for the preceding months namely: the regular meetings, August 2, 4, 7, and 11 and the special meetings: August 16 and 20 were read to the Board for its approval.

It was moved by James F. Brass that the minutes be adopted as read with a minor correction. The motion was seconded by Earl T. Black. On vote, all Commissioners voted Aye.

Marshall Gorrill, Attorney for the Graeber Bros. appeared before the Board and the County Attorney to discuss the matter of a compromise on taxes liable against the said Graeber Bros. and Carl Graeber, individually. Although, the matter was discussed, the Board made no definite decision as of this date.

A Lone Star Lake Association delegation, consisting of Art Weaver, Edwin Fritz, Clifton Ramsey and George Hedrick met with the Board and the County Attorney to discuss the financial conditions of the Lone Star Lake.

The Board of County Commissioners adjourned to resolve themselves into the Board of Social Welfare to carry on business coming to the attention of that Board.

The County Director and Deputy County Director conferred with the Commissioners on several welfare cases, among them the Langton case which received considerable discussion. It has been decided by the Social Welfare Department to contribute \$20.00 per month for the assistance of the five dependent children in the Langton family.

A Mrs. Moredith interviewed the Board relative to having her mother removed from the County Home to a private home in Lawrence. After some discussion action was deferred until a later date, giving Mrs. Moredith time to visit her mother at the home.

The Board conferred with Mr. J. Frank Jones in regard to the welfare of a Mr. Patterson now in the County Hospital, and to the matter of Mr. Patterson paying the County for his care, as he is able financially to do so. The appointing of a guardian to handle his affairs was also discussed, due to Mr. Patterson's
