

COMMISSIONER'S RECORD M

October 27, 1937.

The Commissioners of Douglas County met as the Board of Social Welfare in the Social Welfare Department, with the County Director, and assistants for the purpose of discussing new social security cases.

During the meeting, it was agreed by the Commissioners that any assistance for any old person being a legal resident of this county, leaving this county to make his home in another county with his children, is to be left to the Welfare officials of the counties concerned, for adjustment.

The Board adjourned to meet in special session in the chambers of the Commissioners of Douglas County, to sit as a Board of County Commissioners.

Fred A. Vogler, Sheriff of Douglas County, conferred with the Board on several matters. Among them the question of the county offering a reward for information leading to the capture of the assailant of Russell Kelly, former student of the University of Kansas, if the county may legally do so. However, it was advised by the County Attorney, Charles A. Springer, that the law did not allow the Board to offer such a reward because the crime was not committed in Douglas County.

A Mr. Schneider from the Wm. Roberts Motor Company appeared before the Board with the Sheriff in order to clarify a claim they held against the county for repairs on the Sheriff's car. After a thorough clarification, the Board ordered the payment of the bill.

The A. Reed Wilson claim for fly spray sold to the County Jail, was discussed and after being minutely inspected was allowed.

After considerable discussion on the Monarch Products Company claim for supplies, in the amount of \$588.73, the Board disallowed said bill, and County Clerk placed same in the "Disallowed" file in the County Clerk's office.

No further business appearing, the Board adjourned.

EVERETT BOND and JOHN E. SMITH, both of Lone Star, appeared relative to a change desired in the Cemetery Road half a mile west and about the same distance south of Colyer schoolhouse. Mr. E. E. Trueblood, County Engineer, was called in and the matter gone over carefully.

Mr. Trueblood was instructed to draw up a petition for signatures by the petitioners and early return for consideration by the Board.

Mr. JOHN F. METSKER, Superintendent of the County Farm, came before the Board for general discussion of matters connected with the management of the Farm.

Mr. W. E. SPALDING came in for a word regarding exemption from taxation of the property of the Lawrence Woman's Club.

No other business coming before the Board, Mr. Black moved adjournment to Wednesday, November 3, 1937.

Motion seconded by Mr. Brass and, on proper vote, carried.
