The Commissioners of Douglas County, with a majority of the members present, met in regular adjourned session this day. County Clerk, T. R. Gerhart was also present.

Further claims against the county for wages, materials, supplies and claims as submitted from the Social Welfare Department were presented to the Board, and ordered paid as per Allowance Record.

The Commissioners awarded the contract for steel to be furnished to the county, to the B-D-R Engineering Company, in the amount of \$2047.54. Said contract was signed by the Chairman of the Board. *(constituting fee)*

A. L. Socolofsky, Salesman for the Saml Dodsworth Stationery Company of Kansas City, Mo., appeared before the Board to discuss the purchase of election supplies for the County of Douglas for the forthcoming elections in 1938. Earl T. Black moved that the County Clerk be authorized to purchase these election supplies exclusive of ballots from the Saml Dodsworth Company. James F. Brass seconded the motion. Upon vote, all Commissioners voted "Aye". Mr. S. stated that the cost of said elections would not exceed that of the last preceding elections, 1934, of \$1001.98.

The Project proposal for the County inventory, as formerly submitted by Margaret Ford, was discussed at this time and after being thoroughly considered, James F. Brass moved that the Board accept the project proposal for an inventory of all county equipment as set out in said proposal, and that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to sign as Sponsor's Agent. Earl T. Black seconded the motion. Put to vote, all Commissioners voted "Aye".

A. M. Gardner, County Treasurer, conferred with the Board on several matters.

Mr. Wray, Fire Extinguisher Salesman, again came before the Board in an effort to find the Board's decision on the purchase of fire extinguishers. No definite decision had been reached.

The Board adjourned to convene as a Board of Social Welfare.

Home Visitors and the County Director presented Old Age Assistance cases to the Board for its approval and comments.

The matter of gardens for the year 1938 was also brought up by the County Director and discussed. The County thought it wise to furnish seeds this year to those who are not able to purchase their own.

County Health Physician, H. Penfield Jones, with the County Director conferred with the Board on the case of one Mrs. Jim Ray, who is seeking medical treatment. After some discussion, it was deemed wise to send Mrs. Ray to the clinic of Dr. Gibson, before any decision would be made in the matter.

At this time, Mrs. Watson, brought up the question of continuing with the services of Rachel Pugh for another month. It was agreeable with the Board for the continuance of Miss Rugh's services.

The Board adjourned to meet as a Board of County Commissioners Wednesday, February 16, 1938, unless otherwise called in special session by the Chairman of the Board or the County Clerk.
