

George Melvin, on behalf of the City, appeared before the Board of County Commissioners, suggesting that the matter of the use of the City hospital by the county be contracted for in a lump sum. The matter was merely discussed; no action was taken.

As a Board of Social Welfare, the Commissioners received Mildred D. Watson, County Director on several matters of business.

A Mr. Reed, Supervisor of the county gardens, and a Mr. Cox who had completed some plowing on county gardens, were before the Board relative to the claim of Cox for said work; because heretofore, the claim had been reduced from \$13.50 to \$12.50 by the Board. Receiving explanation from Cox, the Board revised its decision, and increased the amount to \$13.50.

No further business appearing, the Board adjourned to meet Wednesday, April 13, as the Board of County Commissioners.

The Commissioners of Douglas County, met as a Board in the regular meeting rooms in the Douglas County Court House, at 9:30 A. M., this day; there being present: Chris Schaa, Chairman, Earl T. Black and James F. Brass, Commissioners, and T. R. Gerhart, County Clerk.

J. R. Holmes, member of the Tax Payers League and Chas. A. Springer, County Attorney, met with the Board on matters pertaining to the tomato gardening for a number of relief clients of this county. Only a general discussion was gone into.

A request was made by Clifford Harding of the Farm Security Office, that the Board consider employing a stenographer for said office, which will become necessary in the near future due to the fact that two of the present personnel will leave for new positions in another county.

No answer was given Mr. Harding as of this day.

A delegation in the interest of paving certain blocks on Barker Avenue, met with the Board of County Commissioners, the County Attorney and City Attorney to discuss the possibility of securing said improvements.

On the advice of the Commissioners, a committee of five people was chosen among property owners interested in said improvements, for further investigation on this matter.

The Supervisor of the Sewing Room, Mrs. W. O. Hamilton, conferred with the Commissioners on the letting of bids for material needed for the sewing room. Bids had been received from Weavers, Pennys and Jeffries. Decision was made as follows:

E. E. Morris, Bond Salesman, came before the Board on matters regarding the bond issue for Crescent Road. Because of changes in the maturities of the bonds, a new contract was made by said salesman and presented to the Board in lieu of the one previously made now on file in the county clerk's office. New contract reads as follows:

"For \$18,000.00 legally issued Crescent Road bonds of Douglas County, delivered to us in Topeka, Kansas, dated April 1, 1938, and to mature \$1500.00 at 1½%, April 1, 1939, and \$1500.00 at 2% April 1, 1940 and \$1500.00 April 1, 1941 to April 1, 1942 inclusive at 2½% and \$2000.00 at 2½% each year, 1943 to 1948, said bonds to be of the denomination of \$500.00, bearing interest from date at the rate of \_\_\_\_\_ per centum per annum, payable semi annually, both principal and interest payable at Fiscal Agency, Topeka, Kansas.

WE WILL PAY par and accrued interest, plus a premium of \$2.51 per each 1000 bond. County to pay cost of printing."
