All members of the Board of Equalization met this day at the hour of 9:30 A. M.

Lydia Fogerty Sinclair asked the Board to give some consideration to the reduction of the valuation of her property described as: $\operatorname{W2}_{2}$ of $\operatorname{SW2}_{2}$ fr. of 31-15-18. Clinton Township and a long description in Marion Township. The Board informed her that it would give this proper consideration.

Henry Selaer rade a complaint to the Board on the valuation placed on his property, the S_{2}^{1} of \mathbb{NE}^{1}_{0} , 24-12-20, Palmyra Township, which is on the assessment rolls in the amount of 31805.00. Fe claims that 31200 or 31500 would be sufficient. This was taken under consideration.

The County Clerk presented a letter to the Board, received from Glenn Tuttle in regard to his property described as the S 100^a of SW2, 12-14-20, Palmyra Township. In his letter, he stated that he purchased the farm at the price of 22200.00. He did some improvements but only that which was quite necessary. He asked that the Board reduce his valuation more than 22750.00 which he considers the top price for the property. The letter was placed on file, and the request recorded for future action.
