## August 30, 1939.

All members of the Board, namely: Earl T. Black, Chairman, Jas. F. Brass and Chris Schaake, Commissioners and T. R. Gerhart, County Clerk, met this day in regular adjourned session.

The new Directory of Public Officials, edited by John G. Stutz, was presented to the Board by the County Clerk, said directory containing considerable information of utmost importance.

A petition, signed by several taxpayers in Lecompton City and a letter written by Lillie Hartup were received by the Board. Said petition and letter were in regard to the closing of a beer parlor in said city, managed by Mr. Perry Large. Both the letter and petition were handed to the County Attorney for replies.

Cards recommending that the county make it possible for the continuation of the Recreational Project (WPA), under the direction of George Wongwai, were presented to the Board by the County Clerk. Replies will be made to said recommendations, however the maintenance of said project is under the jurisdiction of W.P.A. and not of the county.

The claim of \$39.80 made by A. V. Phillips for plastering and painting in the Commissioners' Room, Clerk of Court's Office and the Red Cross Room, was allowed by the Board as of this date, upon motion, properly seconded and voted.

The resolution authorizing the transfer of \$15,286.08 from the Busidus. Sales Tax Fund to the County Social Welfare Fund, as passed by the Board on August 23rd, was presented to Earl T. Black, Chairman of the Board, for his signature.
