## May 24, 1940.

All members of the Board of County Cormissioners met this day to sit as the Board of Equalization.

Carl Graeber requested the Board to make a reduction in the assessed valuation of his property located at 1017 Rhode Island Street, logally described as the  $S_{2}^{1}$  of Lot 99 and Lot 101, Rhode Island Street. The total valuation on both of these lots is 94,545.00. Fr. Graeber claims that this house is badly in need of repair. He, also, stated that up until about six or eight weeks ago, he was receiving 340.00 per month ront. Fr. Graeber would be satisfied if this valuation was cut to \$3,500.00. The matter was taken under advisement.

The Board adjourned to sit as the Board of County Commissioners.

A Mr. Kurtz from Eudora Township came before the Board to report the need of improvements for a township road two niles cast of Eudora. They are in need of two culverts, grading and rooking. The Board suggested he contact the Engineering Department.

At the hour of 2 o'clock P. M., the Board, accompanied by the County Surveyor, viewed à read in Wakarusa Township, described us: Foginning at the quarter corner on the north line of Section 27-12-19, thence north  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile, and terminating at the center quarter corner Section 22-12-19. This read was viewed for the purpose of temporary closing, as petitioned by Nm. M. Martin and Fifteen others.

After said viewing, the Board reconvened at the courthouse.

Chas. Banning, Shoriff, accompanied by a I'r. Henderson from the Fansas Bureau of Investigation, met with the Corrissioners to discuss a marihuana drive in this county. This drive is for the purpose of eradicating as much marihuana as possible. Fr. Henderson stated that the N.Y.A. would furnish the boys, and that the county would be asked to furnish transportation and tools; the supervision of said drive to be the responsibility of the Shoriff. Nothing definite could be decided this day.

The Board adjourned to meet May 25, 1940.

Jas. F. Brass moved that the bid of the World Company for one mortgage index for the Register of Deed's office at the bid price of \$44.00, be accepted. J. E. Sanderson seconded the motion. On vote, called by Chairman Black, all commissioners voted in the affirmative.

For another discussion on the settlement on delinquent taxes and bridge rentals between the county and the Kansas City, Kaw Valley and Western Railroad Company, appeared W. R. Taylor, Ceneral Manager for said railroad. Mr. Taylor presented to the Board a letter in which there was set out the Trustees' offer of settlement. Their plan of settlement is as follows:

The delinquent rentals to be settled by payment of the \$200.00 sum specified in the Commission's plan. Under the plan this takes care of the accrued rentals up to Fobruary 1, 1939. From that time to date, the rentals to be paid at the price of \$1.00 per loaded car. This amounts to between \$500.00 and \$600.00.

A new contract to be made under which a rental of  $\Im1.60$  per loaded car to be paid for the first 1600 loaded cars crossing the bridge and  $\Im0 \not=$  a car for each car thereafter. The charges under this contract could be subject to revision from time to time in, say, five year periods.

The cash payments connected with this settlement would be the payment by the Trustees of the current taxes at the time of settlement plus \$100.00, under the terms of the Arkansas Valley Interurban plan.

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
