At the hour of 8:30 A. M., all members of the Board of County Commissioners, namely: Earl T. Black, Chairman, Jas. F. Brass and J. M. Sanderson, Commissioners, and T. R. Gerhart, County Clerk, met in regular adjourned session.

M. T. Veatch, Clifton Ramsey, and Raymond Rice, Attorney for Mr. Veatch, met with the Board for the purpose of coming to some definite agreement as to a certain piece of land at the Lone Star Park which should be deeded to the county. Mr. Veatch said that with the fence almost completed, and if he could have the right to a water supply from the well, and the necessary right of way across the park, he would be willing to sign the deed. He, also, said that such a clause to this effect would be in the deed to protect him from future boards.

C. B. Hosford and Daniel H. Spencer appeared before the Board in regard to a sewer connection for part of Mr. Spencer's property in West Hills. This particular land in question was not included in the sewer district, and since there are plans to build new homes up there, it is necessary that some sewer connection be made. According to the Statutes, authorization for such a connection must be given by the Board of County Commissioners, although there is no obligation on the part of the county. No answer was given by the Board this day.

The following Cancellation Order was passed by the Board:

No. 189.² " Because of error in assessment, cancel 1939 real estate tax in the amount of \$40.48, based on a reduction in valuation of \$945.00 on a certain tract of land appearing in the name of Joseph Schopper (since transferred to John Schopper and wife), and fully described by metes and bounds on Page 204, Lines 17 to 35 of the 1939 Eudora City tax roll.

The tract of real estate hereunder consists of 47 acres located within the corporate limits of Eudora City and contains fourteen city blocks with a total of 192 lots. All streets and alleys within the area have been vacated.

Jas. F. Brass moved that the petition presented by Ernest Kasold be accepted and that the time for viewing be set for 2 o'clock P. M., July 31. J. M. Sanderson seconded the motion. On vote, all Commissioners voted "Aye".

Bids for Primary and General elections ballots were opened at this time.

World Company: Legal rate, less 40%. (60%)

Douglas County Republican: Legal rate, less 12%. (88%)

The Baldwin Ledger: Legal rate, less 30%. (70%)

It was moved by Jas. F. Brass that the bid of the World Company for printing ballots for the Primary and General elections as per their bid less 40% of the legal rate, be accepted. A second was made by J. M. Sanderson. On vote, all commissioners voted "Aye".

Some discussion was given to the wiring of the house at the Lone Star Lake, however, nothing definite was done this day.

Al Eliot, also, talked to the Board in regard to the concessions at the Lake.
