He, also, asked the Board to change the location of the concession stand when it is permanently located. Whereupon, the Commissioners went on record agreeing that when the concession stand is located permanently, it will be located away from the front of Mr. Veatch cabin, in such a place, so as not to obstruct the view from said cabin.

Earl Rake, farmer, came before the Board for the purpose of determining if the county wished to buy a building at the Lone Star Park, which formerly was a chicken house and is now being used as a concession stand. Mr. Rake stated that he purchased a barn, cattle shed and a chicken house from D. F. Smith, and, although, he had removed the barn and the cattle shed from the property, which is now part of the Lone Star Park, he had not removed the building, formerly used as a chicken house. Thinking this building was the property of the county. The county, too, was under the impression that this building belonged to the county. Mr. Rake said he would be willing to soll same for \$15.00.
