October 23, 1940.

The Board of County Commissioners, with all members and the County Clerk, present met in adjourned regular session, this 23rd day of October, 1940.

Judge Frank R. Gray and Paul F. Hopkins met with the Board for the purpose of having the daughter of Mr. Hopkins, Paula Virginia Hopkins, accepted as a county patient for the State Training School at Winfield, Kansas. If the Board accepted the girl as a county patient, the county would be required to pay \$40.00 to the school on the admittance of the child to said school and \$40.00 each September thereafter. This amount is used for clothing. Mr. Hopkins said that he could not afford to have the girl go as a private patient, as he was unable to pay the cost of treatment. It was the thought of the Board that if possible, Mr. Hopkins should reimburse the county for the amount paid by said county for the care of the girl at Winfield. Whereupon, Jas. F. Brass moved that the county accept Paula Virginia Hopkins, 14 years of age, as a county patient for the State Training School at Winfield, Kansas, with the provision that Paul F. Hopkins, father, reimburse the county for the cost of treatment at said school. J. M. Sanderson seconded the motion. On vote, called by Chairman Earl T. Black, all commissioners voted "Aye".

John Selzer, his son and a Mr. and Mrs. Lawrenz met with the Commissioners and E. E. Trueblood, County Engineer, praying for the location of a road in Section 29, T 14, R 21, Palmyra Township. The Lawrenz' said they would be having some children going to school in the near future, and they want this road established so they would have a way to get to the school. The Engineer said that to open such a road would necessitate a great deal of work in the way of grading, stump removing etc. The responsibility of such work would fall on the township, but the construction of the bridge would be that of the county. He, also, stated that they could not use a concrete bridge, but would have to have one with a plank floor. The total cost of such a project for the road and bridge would be in the amount of \$3000.00 or more. No action this day.
