The Board conversed with Dr. C. I. Crawford in regard to testing the herd at the County Farm for Bang's disease. Dr. Crawford said that if there are re-acters in the herd take them out and dispose of them through the stockyard, then in about six months take another test from the herd. Dr. Crawford said that the herd was given T-B tests today and in about a couple days he would be back to take a reading of the test.

Alva Hodges, Foreman of the Road Grew asked the Board about their former policy of paying the bridge mon--those that use their cars for transportation- $-2\frac{1}{2}\frac{d}{d}$ per hour for same. Since it is now not necessary for any of the employees to use their car for transportation, the Board informed him that the county would not allow the $2\frac{1}{2}\frac{d}{d}$ per hour.

At the hour of 10 o'clock A. M., bids for the official county printing for the balance of this year, were received and opened. Mrs. Marie Abels (The Outlook), L. C. Leitnaker (The Baldwin Ledger), Ernest Pontius (The Journal World) and Henry Albach (The Lawrence Democrat), were present during the opening.

F. C. Leitnaker of the Baldwin Ledger proposed to the Commissioners a plan whereby all papers in the county would benefit by the county printing and that each would have its share of same. His plan was to allow two of the papers to publish the official publications and delinquent tax list one year, then the next year the remaining two papers would have the county printing. Each paper would charge its own rate for said printing. This plan would eliminate any dispute ever the contract for county printing, such as in the past. Mrs. Marie Abels of The Outlook stated that this plan was agreeable with her paper.

Henry Albach said that he was in favor of awarding the contract to the lowest bidder. He would rather take his chance on the straight bidding rather than the plan as proposed.

Ernest Pontius stated that the Journal-World was not bidding on a compromise at all. He also brought out the fact that the circulation of the Journal-World is about twice that of all the other three papers put together. It was his thought that the paper would not be interested in such a plan, at least not at this time.

Due to an error in his bid formerly presented to the Board, J. D. Seiler presented another bid at this time. in regard to a new roof for the jail. His bid for a tar and gravel roof mopped to the roof and mopped so that felt shall not touch felt made of three layers of felt, with tar and gravel on top is in the amount of 398.28. Bid No. 2: Seiler will furnish two 15# felts (Asphalt) two 30# cap sheets and mopped with four moppings of hot asphalt (30# each). Total weight of 200 pounds per square for the sum of 399.48. This bid was placed on file.

No further business appearing, the Board adjourned to meet Monday, February 24, 1941.
