Manufacturer's bond will be issued for the sum of \$15.00 for the 3 piles of felt as listed above for a period of 15 years, or for the four piles of felt as so listed for a period of 20 years.

If the top surface is mopped instead of being poured and gravel excluded, deduct from the above prices, the sum of \$25.00. If rag felt and asphalt is used, bond limit would be ten years. The charge would be the minimum which is \$15.00.

J. D. Seiler also appeared to discussed the bid from the J. D. Seiler Roofing Company. Said bid, which is revised from former ones, is as follows:

#1 We shall furnish and apply 4-15# tarred felts, properly mopped to the surface, mopped between each and every felt with top felt completely covered with tar pitch poured from a dipper in uniform thickness, for the sum of \$107.76. While the pitch is hot, we shall imbed Joplin chat for the sum of \$12.00. If chat is not used, we shall mop the top surface.

#2 We shall furnish and apply 2-15# asphalt felts and 2-30# cap-sheets per square, properly mopped for \$103.48.

#3 We shall furnish and apply 4-15# asphalt felts top-mopped with hot asphalt for the sum of 399.00.

(The bond on the above would cost \$15.00)

After discussion of the bids, Ed Johnson maved that the Board accept the bid of J. D. Seiler, to recover the roof of the jail, as per proposal No. 1 listed above in said bid, said roof being covered also with chat, and that the county be furnished a 20 year bond, the premium price of same being \$15.00. The county agrees to pay the total sum of \$134.75 for such work. J. Y. Sanderson seconded the motion. On vote, called by Chairman Griffith, all commissioners voted "Aye".

The application of Harold Wilburn for admission to the T. E. Sanatorium at Norton as a county patient was presented to the Board.

J. M. Sanderson moved that Harold Wilburn be accepted as a county patient for admission to the T. B. Sanatorium at Norton. Ed Johnson seconded the motion. On roll call, all commissioners voted in the affirmative.

The following moratorium resolution was by unanimous approval of the Roard passed:

## <u>RESOLUTION</u>

WHEREAS, Section 79-2422, General Statutes, 1935, grants authority to the Hourd of County Commissioners to compromise taxes, interest and penalties on any land or lots which have been bought in by the County and which have been unredeemed for at least a period of four years; and

WHEREAS, there now appears August G. Pahnmaier, owner of the following described property:  $E_1^1$  of NE1 less 2.20<sup>a</sup> Rt. of Way, 21-12-18. 77.80 acros, on which taxes are due and unpaid for the years 1936, 1937, 1938, 1939 and 1940 as shown on the tax sale records of Douglas County, and

WUEREAS, it is the wish of the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, to extend to the above owner of the above described property a right to moratorium privileges similar to those provided in Chapter 326, Session Laws of Kansas for 1939.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, that when taxes for the year 1939 and subsequent years have been paid, said above owner may redeen the above described property now appearing on the tax sale books of Douglas County without paying the penalties, costs or expenses, which are hereby remitted, and by paying interest on such back tax at the rate of six per centum per annum from September 1, 1939.
