The matter of employing a Stamp Plan Manager and Cashier came up for discussion. The application of William Hoffine was considered, as were several others received, and upon his qualifications and recommendations, said William Hoffine was employed as per the following motion. Ed Johnson moved that William B. Hoffine be employed as Stamp Plan Manager for Douglas County for the balance of 1941 at a salary of \$85.00 per month plus 5% per mile for each mile necessarily traveled in line of duty, and that he be required to furnish a bond in the amount of \$7000.00. J.M. Sanderson seconded the motion. On vote, all Commissioners voted in the affirmative.

Regular bills for salaries, wages and supplies were presented to the Board for payment. After close scrutiny and by unanimous vote, such claims were allowed as per Allowance Record on file in the office of the County Clerk.

Bids for contagious disease signs were received and opened. This signs are to be used under the supervision of the County Health Physician.

J. M. Sanderson moved that the bid of The Outlook for printing 950 quarantine signs as specified in the amount of \$22.00 be accepted, they being the low bidder. Ed Johnson seconded the motion. On vote, all Commissioners voted "Aye".

Consideration was given to the employment of a Care Taker for the Camp Site at the Lone Star Park, to have charge of the buildings and grounds of the camp site, in additional to Harry Gregg now the Superintendent of the Lake. The applicant for this position is Otis Lindell. It was the opinion of the Board that it was a necessity to have such a care taker, whereupon J. M. Sanderson moved that Otis Lindell be employed as Superintendent of the Camp Site and camp buildings at the Lone Star Park for the balance of 1941 at a salary of \$55.00 per month, effective May 2, 1941, the county to furnish a house, namely the smallest officers' building, with the understanding that a change may be made at the discretion of the county board. Ed Johnson seconded the motion. On vote, called by Chairman L. H. Griffith, all Commissioners voted in favor of the motion.

The Board adjourned to meet Friday, May 2, at 9 o'clock A. M. A.

As per adjournment, the Board of County Commissioners, with all members and the County Clerk present, met in the regular meeting rooms of said Board at 9 o'clock A. N.

For a discussion on improvements for the Lone Star Park, appeared a delegation consisting of George Hedrick, Art Weaver, Earnest Boyce, Edwin Fritz, Junis Underwood, Ernie Pontius and Cecil Hough.

It was suggested by Art Weaver that it would be advisable to have some major plan worked out, in order that the county may work toward this in the future. All improvements could not be done at one time. As pointed out by the Chairman of the Board, the first thing in the line of improvements is to get the roads at the park in good condition. Whereupon, detailed discussion was gone into regarding the type of roads for the park. It was suggested by George Hedrick that some architect work out a long life plan in regard to the buildings and grounds, and thought that some cooperation could be had from the University along this line. Earnest Boyce caution the commissioner as to the termite situation at the park. He suggested it might be probable to have a WPA project work on this angle of it. It was suggested that some representatives from the University and this delegation meet with the Commissioners at the park Monday, May 5.

Earl Williamson, former employee of the Welfare Department (truck driver) appeared before the Board, asking that the County pay him for overtime, which pay he has never received over a period of time in the past. J. M. Sanderson, Commissioner informed him that since most of this occurred while the former Board of County Commissioners was governing county business, he did not feel that this was the proper time to present such a claim for back overtime and declared he was not in favor of paying same.

The Board authorized Harry Gregg, Superintendent of the Lone Star Lake, to purchase screen wire, for the use of his home at the lake, from M. D. Flory at Lone Star.

Oscar Learnard, Attorney for Earl Williamson, presented the claim of said Williamson for overtime while in the county's employee. Mr. Learnard asked that the Board investigate this matter. The Board said it would look into the matter and reach a decision at a later date.
