In regular adjourned session, all membors of the Board of County Commissioners, namely: L. H. Griffith, Chairman, M. N. Penny and Ed Johnson, Commissioners, and County Clerk, T. R. Gerhart, met in the regular mosting rooms of said Board.

The Board discussed the matter of employing an assistant for Otis Lindell, Superintendent of the Lone Star Park. Because of the urgent need for said assistant. M. N. Penny moved that Otis Lindell, Superintendent of the Lone Star Lake, be authorized to hire an extra man for help at said lake at the compensation of \$75.00 per month plus the furnishing of living quarters; the county agrees to pay half of the electricity used at the assistant's house, he to pay the remaining half. Ed Johnson seconded the motion. On roll call by Chairman Griffith, all Commissioners voted in the affirmative.

The strike situation in the coal industry was discussed with George Hedrick, Secretary of the Chamber of Commorce. Bitterly opposed against such labor strikes, the Board, after discussing this matter with Mr. Hedrick, sent the following letter to the President of the United States:

The President White House Washington, D. D.

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Dear Mr. President:

The Board of County Commissionors of Douglas County, Kansus, urges the President of the United States to take immediate decisive action. In line with the recommendation of the War Labor Board, to settle the labor controversy in the coal industry.

We believe that we express the almost unanimous sentiment in this community when we say that there must be no delay, by any individuals or groups, in the maximum production and delivery of war materials to our armed forces.
