## May 9, 1944

The Board of County Commissioners, with all members present, met in special session this day, called for the purpose of discussing the serious threat of rabies to citizens and domestic animals of this county.

Representatives from the City of Lawrence and other communities were present, those being Clarence Gorrill, City Attorney, Harry Lucas, Baldwin City, John Miller, Eudora City, George Matthews, Lecompton. Also, Rody Skinner, Sheriff, R. W. Sanders, Deputy Sheriff, John Riling, County Attorney and as per request, Will J. Miller, State Livestock Sanitary Commissioner and E. A. Sims, local representative of the state livestock sanitary commission.

Rabies has become a serious problem to some of the counties in this state, and because of strong evidence that same was prevalent, said counties were placed under strict quarantime. The symptoms of this disease has been found to exist in Douglas County.

A small number of dogs have already been killed by laymen, these dogs having attacked children or showing signs of being afflicted with the disease, either by their actions or by the foaming at the mouth.

Since rabies is a disease of extreme seriousness, resulting in death to both animals and humans, and since the number of stray dogs has increased considerably, it was the concensus of opinion of all those present that some action be taken as a precautionary measure against the spread of rabies.

Thereupon, the following resolution, by proper motion, second and vote, was adopted by the Board

## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, symptoms of a disease known as RABIES now exists among certain domestic animals within the limits of Douglas County, Kansas, and

WHEREAS, the health and lives of citizens and domestic animals of said area are in danger, and

WHEREAS, it has been determined necessary to prevent the spread of rables among domestic animals of said area.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, that all dogs in Douglas County, be quarantimed in accordance with the orders and directions of the Livestock Sanitary Commissioner of the State of Kansas; and that the State Livestock Sanitary Commissioner is hereby requested to put said quarantime into effect in Douglas County, Kansas.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the governing bodies of all towns and communities in Douglas County, be and are hereby requested to cooperate in the enforcement of any quarantime orders issued by the State Livestock Sanitary Commissioner.
