

# COMMISSIONER'S RECORD N

January 31, 1948.

The Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County met in regular adjourned session, all members of the Board being present.

County Engineer E. E. Larson presented to the Board bids received on trucks, as follows: 1. one--1938 Model Chevrolet, 1½ ton chassis, to H. Lyle Weeks, for \$182.00; 2. one--1936 Model Dodge, ½ ton pickup, to G. E. Pipes, at \$113.00. The bids were accepted by the Board.

The Board signed a resolution releasing the U. S. Fidelity and Guaranty Company, a corporation, from the surety bond of Beattie Collins, Township Treasurer of Lecompton Township, said Beattie Collins having filed a second surety bond on January 7, 1948, with the Maryland Casualty Company, a corporation, for one year, resolution as follows:

## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, finds that the U. S. Fidelity and Guaranty Company, a corporation, is surety on a surety bond in the amount of \$15,000.00, issued on January 13, 1947, for a two year term upon the condition that Beattie Collins, as Township Treasurer of Lecompton Township, Douglas County, Kansas, will well and faithfully perform all the duties incumbent upon him, by reason of his election as Township Treasurer of Lecompton Township, Douglas County, Kansas, and honestly account for all monies coming into his hands as said treasurer, as provided by law, and said Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, duly approved said surety bond.

WHEREAS, The Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, further finds that Beattie Collins, as Township Treasurer of Lecompton Township, Douglas County, Kansas, made and gave a second surety bond dated January 7, 1948, said surety company being the Maryland Casualty Company, a corporation, said surety bond being in the amount of \$7,500.00, and said surety bond being for a term of one year.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, further finds that the U. S. Fidelity and Guaranty Company, a corporation, by its agent, Holmes, McGrew & Peck of Lawrence, Kansas, have asked to be discharged from any further liability on their surety bond, as herein set out, and said Board further finds that the U. S. Fidelity and Guaranty Company, a corporation, should be released and discharged from any further liability on their surety bond, for the period from January 13, 1948, to the expiration date of their surety bond.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County, Kansas, in regular session assembled this 31st day of January, 1948, that the U. S. Fidelity and Guaranty Company, a corporation, be released and discharged from any further liability upon their surety bond, dated January 13, 1947, for a two year term, in the amount of \$15,000.00, wherein Beattie Collins, Township Treasurer of Lecompton Township, Douglas County, Kansas, is the principal and said U. S. Fidelity and Guaranty Company, a corporation, is the surety, from January 13, 1948, to the expiration date of said surety bond.
