Cornish as Special Master under said decrees entered in the suits herinbefore mentioned brought by F. Gordon Dexter and Oliver Ames, Second, as trustees, for the foreclosure of said first mortgage of said The Union Pacific Railroad Company dated November 1, 1860, and which were conveyed to the Railroad Company, party of the first part, in and by the said deed bearing date the 22d day of January, 1898, executed pursuant to such decrees by said William D. Cornish, Special Master, and others; and also all and singular the whole line of railroad and telegraph, together with the rolling stock, fixtures and property of every kind and description appurtenant thereto or connected with the use or operation thereof which were sold on the first day of November, 1897, by William D. Cornish as Special Master, under and in pursuance of said decrees entered in the suits herinbefore mentioned brought by the United States
