miles to the town of Neodesha in Sec. 19, T. 30 S., R. 16 E., Wilson County, Kansas; a 2" Interal extending east from above mentioned 16" main line into Neosho County, Kansas to the town of Thayer, consisting of 2.0 miles of 2" pipe in Wilson County, and 2.7 miles of 2" pipe in Neosho County.

Also a 6" Interal extending south from the Thayer Compressor Station to the above described Parsons 8" lateral consisting of 7.0 miles of 6" pipe in Wilson County.

Thence continuing northeast through Neosho County, Kansas with two 16" lines to the Allen County, Kansas line, said line totaling 4.1 miles of 16" pipe in Neosho County, Kansas;

Thence continuing fortheast into Allen County, Kansas with two 16" lines to the Petrolia Compressor Station in Sec. 32, T. 26 S., R. 18 E., Allen County, Kansas, said line totaling 3.9 miles of 16" pipe in Allen County, Kansas.

Also an 8" lateral extending south from the Petrolia Compressor Station to Channte in Neosho County, Kansas, said line totaling 0.9 miles of 8" pipe, in Allen County, Kansas, and 2.6 miles of 8" pipe, 3.6 miles of 6" pipe, 0.3 miles of 5" pipe, 0.2 miles of 4" pipe, and 0.2 miles of 2" pipe in Neosho county, Kansas; also, an 8" lateral extending east from the Petrolia Compressor Station to Fort Scott in Bourbon County, Kansas, said line totaling 21.0 miles of 8" pipe in Allen County, Kansas, and 22.6 miles more or less of 8" pipe in Bourbon County, Kansas.

GRABHAM STATION TO SAGINAW STATION.

A combination 16" and 12" pipeline extending from the Grabham Compressor Station in Montgomery County, Kansas, cast to Joplin, Missouri and south to the Saginaw Compressor Station in Newton County, Missouri, and passing through Montgomery, Labette and Cherokee Counties, Kansas, and Jasper and Newton counties, Missouri, with laterals in Labette, Cherokee and Crawford Counties, Kansas; Craig County, Oklahoma, and Jasper County, Missouri, said line being more specifically described as follows:

Beginning at the Grabham Compressor Station in Montgomery County, Kansas, as previously described a single 16" line extends east to the Labette County,
